THIS YEAR'S SCORECARD

THE PENNSYLVANIA ENVIRONMENTAL SCORECARD IS A JOINT PROJECT OF CONSERVATION VOTERS OF PA, CLEAN WATER ACTION, SIERRA CLUB PENNSYLVANIA CHAPTER, AND CLEAN AIR ACTION.

Pennsylvania is one of the only states with a constitutional right to clean air, pure water, and the preservation of the natural environment. Yet decisions made every day in Harrisburg can either uphold these rights or undermine them.

Too often, the public never sees how lawmakers vote on the policies that impact our air, water, health, and energy costs. This scorecard exists to change that. Democracy works best when voters have clear, accessible information and can hold their elected officials accountable.

The 2025-2026 Environmental Scorecard tracks key votes taken by the General Assembly and provides a lifetime score for each legislator dating back to the 2007-2008 session, offering a clear picture of long-term priorities and performance.

Prior to each vote, our organizations work together to make sure that legislators understand the environmental impacts of the legislation in question and know how to best cast their votes for the environment, our health and our democracy. This includes direct conversations with legislators and their staff, calls and emails from the members of our organizations and the general public, position papers explaining the legislation in question, and other modes of communication.

The 2025-2026 session took place under divided government, with Democrats holding a narrow one seat House majority and Republicans controlling the Senate. These divisions meant that, with the exception of the state budget, none of the legislation passed by either chamber advanced to the Governor's desk to become law.

The House advanced a record number of pro-environment measures, including limits on data centers, a clean manufacturing tax credit, and a ban on PFAS-laden firefighting foam that passed unanimously. At the same time, important proposals to expand clean energy standards, strengthen environmental justice community protections, and modernize Pennsylvania's energy mix failed to reach final passage in the House, despite significant support. Pennsylvania still generates only about 4% of its energy from renewable sources, leaving consumers exposed to rising costs and pollution risks.

The Senate primarily advanced legislation that would weaken environmental oversight, hamstring clean energy policy, and add unnecessary regulatory burdens. These bills raise concerns about transparency, accountability, and long-term impacts to our state agencies, environment and communities. Meanwhile, numerous environmental and democracy bills that passed by the House with significant bipartisan support were not taken up in the Senate.

Most notably though, both chambers voted to block Pennsylvania from joining the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) through the state budget. This forfeited billions in potential clean energy investment, significant emissions reductions, and desperately needed public health benefits.

This scorecard is designed to bring transparency to these decisions and ensure Pennsylvanians can see where their legislators stand. An informed public is essential to protecting both our environment and our democracy, and to building a healthier, more affordable future for all. We hope this scorecard will be another tool in the ongoing fight to chart a better path for Pennsylvania's environmental future.

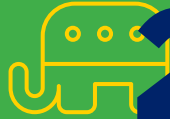

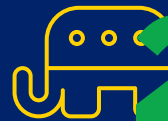

BILL DESCRIPTIONS

HOUSE BILL 1261

PFAS Firefighting Foam Ban

*Passed in the House (202-0)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Prohibits the use of PFAS-laden firefighting foam beginning in 2026, and directs Fire Commissioner and DEP to work together to assist fire companies with disposal. Requires warning label for all firefighting PPE containing PFAS.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 1396

Election Reform

*Passed in the House (102-101)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Helps to modernize our election system, while also maintaining the security measures that keep elections safe. Includes provisions like pre-canvassing, expanding access to mail-in voting and machine-based early voting, and reforming recount rules.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 504

Community Energy

*Passed in the House (114-89)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Enables community energy projects and will expand Pennsylvania’s energy portfolio by allowing multiple customers within a certain geographic area to receive their energy from an off-site solar array or anaerobic digester. This is especially beneficial to low-income homeowners and renters who otherwise would not be able to install alternative sources of energy on their property.

HOUSE BILL 505

Act 129 Reform

*Passed in the House (102-101)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Reforms Pennsylvania’s flagship energy efficiency and conservation program to make it more accessible for low-income ratepayers and help industries further reduce energy consumption.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 1599

PJM Transparency

*Passed in the House (159-43)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Requires an electric utility company within PJM to disclose any recorded vote they make and provide a description on how that vote was in the public interest.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 416

Anti-RGGI Fiscal Code

*Passed in the House (189-14)
Passed in the Senate (43-6)
Signed into law by the Governor*

Prohibits Pennsylvania from entering the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), which is the most consequential climate program in our Commonwealth’s history.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “No”

HOUSE BILL 1364

Investing in Mass Transit

*Passed in the House (107-96)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Invests nearly \$300 million into public transportation agencies across Pennsylvania.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 1556

Advanced Clean Manufacturing Tax Credit

*Passed in the House (104-93)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Establishes a tax credit to promote in-state production of clean manufacturing products.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

BILL DESCRIPTIONS

HOUSE BILL 1260

Solar-Ready Warehouses

*Passed in the House (101-98)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Requires all new warehouse facilities built in Pennsylvania to have 40% of their roof be structurally compatible for solar panels.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 2246

Water Usage Reporting Requirements for Data Centers

*Passed in the House (116-84)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Requires data centers to report substantial water usage to DEP to accurately track how much water each facility consumes.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 1834

Data Center Act

*Passed in the House (104-95)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Requires data centers in Pennsylvania to source a portion of their power from renewable energy and contribute to ratepayer assistance programs.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 2076

Advancing Geothermal Energy Deployment

*Passed in the House (118-83)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Establishes a regulatory framework for the construction of geothermal energy facilities in Pennsylvania.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 2151

Model Data Center Ordinance

*Passed in the House (133-68)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Creates a model ordinance municipalities can use to set standards for data center development and operations.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 2302

Licensing for Water Well Drillers

*Passed in the House (114-87)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Establishes licensing requirements for companies that are drilling new water wells in Pennsylvania.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 2333

Pro-Environment Chapter 14 Reauthorization

*Passed in the House (107-94)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Bolsters protections for ratepayers and implements a summer moratorium on utility shutoffs for low-income households.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

HOUSE BILL 2145

PFAS in Consumer Products

*Passed in the House (188-13)
Awaiting action in the Senate*

Bans the sale of certain consumer products in Pennsylvania that contain PFAS.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “Yes”

SENATE BILL 154

Anti-Environment Chapter 14 Reauthorization

*Passed in the Senate (41-7)
Awaiting action in the House*

Reauthorizes Chapter 14 without critical protections for low and moderate income ratepayers.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “No”

SENATE BILL 311

Anti-Renewables Energy Choice

*Passed in the Senate (34-15)
Awaiting action in the House*

Takes away communities’ ability to incentivize the use of renewable energy or limit fossil fuel use in residential properties.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “No”

SENATE BILL 186

RGGI Abrogation

*Passed in the Senate (31-18)
Awaiting action in the House*

Prevents Pennsylvania from entering the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), or enacting any sort of cap-and-invest carbon regulation to reduce harmful emissions.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “No”

SENATE BILL 333

REINS Act

*Passed in the Senate (27-23)
Awaiting action in the House*

Requires the General Assembly to pass a concurrent resolution to approve any final-form rulemaking deemed “economically significant” before it can be implemented. If one or both chambers failed to act, the final regulation would be deemed not approved and would not be implemented, potentially halting significant environmental legislation needed to protect at-risk communities.

SENATE BILL 187

Independent Energy Office

*Passed in the Senate (27-21)
Awaiting action in the House*

Establishes a duplicative and politicized Independent Energy Office and contains provisions that could put hundreds of millions of dollars of alternative fuels funding at risk.

SENATE BILL 1236

Weakening the Clean Streams Law

*Passed in the Senate (30-20)
Awaiting action in the House*

Waives requirements for a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit, allowing for companies to bypass environmental protections for waterways.

SENATE BILL 444

Automatic Three-Year Review of “Economically Significant” Regulations

Passed in the Senate (27-23)

Awaiting action in the House

Creates extraneous layers of bureaucracy that would place considerable time and capacity strains on agencies and the Independent Regulatory Review Commission without any new funding or support.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “No”

SENATE BILL 6

Transparency in Permitting

Passed in the Senate (28-22)

Awaiting action in the House

Provides for third party permitting which will force agencies to allow private companies to make permitting decisions without clear oversight.

The Pro-Environment Vote is “No”

SENATE BILL 416

Anti-RGGI Fiscal Code

Passed in the House (189-14)

Passed in the Senate (43-6)

Signed into law by the Governor

Prohibits Pennsylvania from entering the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), which is the most consequential climate program in our Commonwealth's history.
